MEETING CALLED TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order at 5:30 p.m.

MINUTES:

On a motion made by Commissioner Wilson, seconded by Commissioner Dumenil, the Board unanimously agreed to approve the Agenda for the current meeting, the Regular and Closed Session Minutes of August 22, 2023, Roads Minutes of August 8, 2023 and Sanitary Minutes of August 8th and 22, 2023.

PRESENTATION:

US 50/301 KENT ISLAND TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT PILOT:

Commissioner Moran highlighted the following: Beginning Saturday, September 16, and continuing each Saturday and Sunday for three consecutive weekends, the State Highway Administration and Queen Anne's County will restrict access onto westbound US 50/301 at three locations:

- Service road/Shopping Center Road between Exit 39A (Castle Marina Road) and Exit 38 (Duke Street);
- Duke Street (Exit 38) and MD 8 (Business Parkway/Romancoke Road, Exit 37).

Drivers will continue to have access exiting US 50/301 onto MD 8 and MD 18 but will not have access to enter onto westbound US 50 at these locations from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays, September 16, 17, 23, 24, 30 and October 1. Detour signs will direct motorists to MD 18 east to Castle Marina Road south to westbound US 50.

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While this pilot will not fix the longstanding congestion around the Bay Bridge, we anticipate it will provide some relief for residents and businesses on Kent Island during peak weekend travel periods,” explains State Highway Administration Administrator Will Pines. “We are partnering with Queen Anne’s County to help reduce local road congestion by routing MD 18 traffic on Kent Island back to US 50/301 at one location. Drivers headed west to the Bay Bridge on weekends can help themselves while helping local residents and emergency responders by staying on US 50.”

CHESAPEAKE COLLEGE QUEEN ANNE’S TECHNICAL BUILDING PROJECT:

Dr. Cliff Coppersmith, President, presented to the Board the Chesapeake College’s proposal for Queen Anne’s Technical Center at the College. This project will house programs such as Electrical, Welding, HVAC, Culinary, Skilled Office/Administrative Support and Marine and Construction Trades training. A letter of support is requested for this project. The total project is estimated at \$79,091,771 with State Support funding at 75%. Caroline, Dorchester, Kent, Talbot and Queen Anne’s Counties are to provide local funds to match the State allocation. Chesapeake College is asking to execute a Letter of Intent

STRATEGIC ASSET EVALUATION AND INDUSTRY COMPETITIVENESS ANALYSIS VENDOR SELECTION:

Ms. Heather Tinelli, Director, Economic & Tourism Development submitted to the Board the Strategic Asset Evaluation and Industry Competitiveness Analysis Vendor Selection. Queen Anne's County Economic & Tourism Development sought funding from Maryland Department of Commerce to complete a Strategic Asset Evaluation and Industry Competitiveness Analysis. The initiative was awarded funding through Maryland Department of Commerce's Rural Maryland Economic Development Fund and is being administered by Upper Shore Regional Council. QACETD solicited proposals that will provide its Economic Development Commission (EDC) with a detailed understanding of the resources it can leverage to support integrated workforce and economic development initiatives, and strengthen its competitive position in the global economy. The overall goal of the project is to assess sites for industrial development, review and improve site visit presentations, and increase industry competitiveness. Once complete, the information from the analyses will inform the second part of the project: an updated Strategic Plan for the Economic Development Commission. At a meeting on August 23, 2023 a grant review committee discussed the six applications and voted to recommend M3 Synergies & Envistra LLC as the candidate for the project because of the applicant's experience.

On a motion made by Commissioner Wilson, seconded by Commissioner Dumenil, the Board unanimously agreed to approve the selection of M3 Synergies & Envistra LLC as the vendor for Queen Anne's County Economic & Tourism Development's Strategic Asset & Industry Competitiveness Analysis project with a total cost of \$29,835 and funding through Rural Maryland Economic Development Funds.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVE FUNDING – SAVE THE DAY ESCAPE ROOMS, LLC:

Ms. Heather Tinelli, Director, Economic & Tourism Development submitted to the Board for their review and approval a request for funding from EDIF. The Economic Development Incentive Fund (EDIF) Commission recommends the approval of a conditional loan of up to \$20,000 to Save the Day Escape Rooms, LLC located at 460 Main Street, Stevensville. These funds will be used to purchase furniture and equipment needed for the startup of four classic novel themed escape rooms and allow the business to open by October 2023. The total project cost will be \$95,000 and Save the Day Escape Rooms is requesting \$20,000 from the Economic Development Incentive Fund. They will be using \$25,000 of their own capital, and a low-interest VOLT fund loan for the remainder of the project. The EDIF Commission has recommended that the award be conditioned upon the creation of 6 full-time equivalent jobs within 3 years of the EDIF conditional loan agreement. The business is to remain in full operation in the county for an additional two years, resulting in a five year commitment. The agreement to be prepared by QACETD staff and reviewed by the county attorney will include guarantees, employment reporting requirements as well as businesses mentoring. Upon performance of the conditions of the agreement, the conditional loan would convert to a grant.

On a motion made by Commissioner Wilson, seconded by Commissioner Dumenil, the Board unanimously agreed to approve the disbursement of up to \$20,000 from the Economic Development Incentive Fund to Save the Day Escape Rooms, LLC for the purchase of furniture and equipment for startup of four themed escape rooms. This disbursement of funds is contingent upon an executed agreement between the EDIF Commission and Save the Day Escape Room, LLC outlining the terms and conditions in accordance with the application submitted to the EDIF Commission.

BATTS NECK PARK IN-LINE HOCKEY RINK BOARD REPLACEMENT:

Mr. Steve Chandlee, Director of Parks and Recreation submitted to the Board for their review and approval the In-line Hockey Rink Board Replacement. The Department of Parks and Recreation is requesting permission to contract Becker Arena Products to furnish and install new dasher board facing, cap rail and kickplate for the In-Line Hockey Rink at Batts Neck Park, in the amount of \$142,942. FERRY POINT HABITAT ENHANCEMENT PROJECT REDESIGN:

If approved, the Department of Parks and Recreation is also requesting permission to contract Sustainable Science, LLC to develop the proposal for the slope stabilization and habitat enhancement redesign for 200 feet of shoreline at Ferry Point Park, in the amount of \$25,750. No county funds are needed.

QUEEN ANNE’S COUNTY EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN:

Mr. Scott Haas, Director, DES submitted to the Board for their review and approval the Emergency Operations Plan. The Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act recognized the need for Federal, State, and Local government to develop comprehensive plans and programs for preparation against disasters. An Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) is a required document under the Stafford Act that outlines procedures and protocols to be followed during various types of emergencies or disasters. It typically includes information on how to respond to natural disasters, such as hurricanes, earthquakes, or floods, as well as human-made crises like terrorist attacks or industrial accidents. The EOP details roles and responsibilities, communication methods, evacuation routes, resource allocation, and other crucial information to ensure effective coordination and response in times of crisis. These plans are commonly developed by government agencies, organizations, or institutions to safeguard lives and property during emergencies. The Department of Emergency Services is recommending the Board of County Commissioners to endorse and promulgate the 2023 Emergency Operations Plan. The EOP has gone through a twelve-month review process and has been approved by all stakeholders identified within the plan.
